Exam Format: Multiple Choice via Canvas Timed 40 Minute Exams at Home

Class Description: Methods, theory, and analysis of physiological processing; The study of psychological and biological approaches to the study of Movement, EEG Wakefulness and Sleep, the Physiology of Learning and Memory, Cognitive Functions, Mood Disorders and Schizophrenia, Internal Regulation and culminating with current investigations of physiology using modern psychophysiological recording techniques.

Textbook: Biological Psychology (11th or 12th edition) by James Kalat (Wadsworth)

Class Structure: We will cover approximately ½ to 1 chapter per week beginning with Chapter 8 (Movement) of the 11th edition (which is Chapter 7 of the 12th or 13th edition). The later editions have one fewer chapters and are one chapter lower in number than the 11th edition. Next we will cover Chapter 9 (EEG Wakefulness and Sleep) of the 11th edition, then Chapter 13 (Physiology of Learning and Memory) of the 11th edition, then Chapter 14 (Cognitive Functions) of the 11th edition, then Chapter 15 (Mood Disorders & Schizophrenia) of the 11th edition, then Chapter 10 (Internal Regulation) of the 11th edition. You will have an exam approximately every 5 weeks for a total of 3 exams (6-8 Chapters). If I change anything about the class I will give you plenty of notice, via Canvas or e-mail notification. I reserve the right to change anything and everything about the class.

The 1st Exam is scheduled for Thursday, March 7th*(Add/Drop Deadline is 2-16)

The 2nd Exam is scheduled for Thursday, April 11th*(No Classes 3-25 thru 3-29)

The 3rd Exam is scheduled for Thursday, May 16th*(last day of class)

Exam Format: Each of the three exams will consist of 40 multiple choice items. All of the exams will be administered via Canvas on the Thursdays listed above. The exams will be available to start any time on Thursday but **must** be completed by 11:59 p.m. Pacific Standard Time, Thursday night. Once you start the exam you will have 40 minutes to finish the exam (DPRC students will have accommodations provided that are specific to their individual DPRC letters). Thus, the latest you can start the exam is 11:20 pm on the Thursdays above in order to have the full 40 minutes. DPRC students must start the exam earlier, specific to their individual letters to allow full time before 11:59 p.m.

Grading: Your Final grade will be based on **the sum of all three exams** according to the scale below. You must take all three exams and there will be **NO MAKE-UP EXAMS**. **Any form of cheating will equal an F.**

Extra Credit: You may earn up to 5 extra credit points for this course via the Psychology Departments SONA system for EEG and ERP Cognitive

Psychophysiological studies **ONLY**. Usually a 1 hour experiment earns you 1 Extra Credit point. All extra credit is due (via e-mail screen shot sent to mgeisler@sfsu.edu) on Wednesday, May 15th, 2024, the day **BEFORE** the last exam on Thursday, May 16th, 2024.
